Total loss on Salthouse beach, near Blakeney, Nov. 19, 1875. Crew all drowned except the captain, Andrew Gatenby, he being on one of the masts which stood.

ELIZABETH.—Bg.; 182; Dundee, 1836; Reg. Wy., Dec., 1865; Owners, Ed. Storm, H. Allison, M. Bell, and Robt. Wilson.

"Elizabeth," Capt., Will. Bell, and four hands, Sunderland to New Dieppe, sprung a leak and was abandoned 22nd April, 1867. Crew taken off by the Bremen ship "Adelaide." The same day she was found derelict, and brought into Bremerhaven by two English smacks and a Hanoverian pilot boat two days later.

Sold by auction for £355, and bought by the original owner, "who has given me charge of the ship again."

Sold to be broken up, March, 1877.

ELIZABETH.—Bg.; 198; Workington, 1823; Reg. Wy., 1866; Owner, Will. Russell, R.H.B.

"'Elizabeth,' Capt., W. Porritt, and six hands, London for Hartlepool. Succession of gales, was driven over to coast of Hanover. On 3rd Nov., 1868, came to the ground on island of Norderney, with a heavy gale at W. and thick with rain, beat heavily and broke up. Crew took refuge on the bowsprit. About 11 p.m. the lifeboat came to the assistance of the crew, and on the third attempt succeeded in saving them, and landed them at Norderney."
